A. Call to Order.

The Chair called the meeting to order at 6:01 PM.

B. Public Comment.

Jay Tulin, 39 Timberline Drive

Mr. Tulin shared that he enjoyed the March 21, 2019 Public Meeting and asked the Committee not to forget about signage in the Study Area. He also stressed the importance of ADA Compliance.

C. Reading of the Minutes.

1) To approve the attached March 7, 2019 minutes. (Attachment A)

Upon a motion made and seconded (Sanford/Nickerson) it was unanimously VOTED: to approve the March 7, 2019 minutes.

2) To approve the attached March 21, 2019 minutes. (Attachment B)

Brian Connolly requested the minutes be changed to reflect that he was present at the meeting.

Upon a motion made and seconded (Sanford/Nickerson) it was unanimously VOTED: to approve the March 21, 2019 minutes as amended.

D. To provide feedback on various streetscape improvement design options.

The committee reviewed the streetscape improvement options that were presented to the public on March 21, 2019. The committee had the opportunity to provide feedback on these design options to see how the committee's priorities aligned with the communities. In general, the committee and the community selected the same streetscape enhancement options with a few minor variations

E. To review the March 21, 2019 public meeting input/results and the online survey results of the streetscape improvement design options.

Jef Faser of BSC Group gave an overview of the results from the Streetscape improvement design. **See Attachment 1.**

Overall, it was very apparent that sidewalks are a priority and the community had equal

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interest in lighting, flags, banners, streets trees, and gateways.

F. To review and take action on the recommendation(s) from BSC Group on early action items.

Jef Faser gave a list of suggested early action items for the committee to consider.

- 1) Landscape Islands and Medians (appearance and corrective action)
- 2) New crosswalks and ramps (accessibility, safety and appearance) at Meadow Road, the Farmington Fire Station, and School Street.
 - a. These locations were selected because they are already existing crosswalks, so they would not be subject to additional Department of Transportation approvals.
- 3) Hanging Flower Baskets on the DiPietro Bridge.
- 4) Walking Tour for residents, visitors, local promotion
- 5) Public Art (placemaking, appearance, local culture)
- 6) Combine Island Planting with Public Art

G. To review the next steps for BSC Group and the Committee.

From BSC Group's recommendations, the Committee decided to form two sub-committees. These committees will be 1. Walking Tour Sub-committee and 2. Route 4 Triangle (Median) Sub-Committee. Staff will send out an email to the entire committee to see who is interested in serving on the sub-committees.

The Committee tasked the Town Manager to work with Town Staff to implement the recommended new crosswalks and ramps in the study area. It was also decided that the next Committee Meeting will be focused on giving recommendations to BSC Group for sidewalks in the study area. BSC Group will be presenting their final recommendations at the following meeting.

H. To provide an update on the Farmington Village Green & Library Association Landscape Plan.

Update will be given at the next Committee meeting.

I. To provide an update on Parsons Property acquisition.

Kathy Eagen gave an update on the status of the acquisition of Parsons Property. Kathy and Rose Ponte met with Division of Rights of Way at the Department of Transportation to discuss the next steps for the Town. Town Representatives also met with State Legislators to request assistance with amending House Bill No. 7101 - June Special Session, Special Act No. 15-1.

J. To approve a Meeting Schedule (Please bring your calendars.)

The next meeting will be May 9th at 6:00 pm. Staff will email the committee members to schedule an additional meeting in June.

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

Key to Farmington's Freedom Trail

- 13 Church St Union Hall CT Site of abolitionist and anti-abolitionist meetings.
- 75 Main St First Church of Christ 1771 NRHP Freed Amistad survivors were welcomed here. CT
- 66 Main St Samuel Deming House CT An abolitionist who supervised the African stay.
- 4. Farmington and the Freedom Trail Marker HMdb
- 2 Mill Lane Samuel Deming Store Africans attended classes on the second floor.
- 116 Main St Rev. Noah Porter House CT An abolitionist & minister of the First Church.
- 127 Main St Austin F. Williams House CT NRHP & (yellow) Carriage House, a dormitory for the Africans.
- 8. Riverside Cemetery and Foone's burial site.
- 128 Garden St. Pitkin Basin HMdb Africans would swim in Pitkin Basin after work.
- 820 Farmington Ave Chauncey Brown House CT Dr. Brown housed an Amistad captive.
- 27 Main St Smith-Cowles House CT A station for the Underground Railroad.

CT = Connecticut Historial Commission NRPH = National Register of Historic Places HMdb = Historic Marker Database

The Farmington Historical Society tour of these sites is highly recommended.

- Mountain Spring Rd Elijah Lewis House
 Fugitive slaves were hidden here.
- 11 Mountain Spring Rd John Norton House. Norton was CT a founding member of the Anti-Slavery Society in 1836.
- 340 Main St Timothy Wadsworth House CT An Underground Railroad station.
