A. Call to Order.

C. Public Comment.

Matt Hutvagner, 4 Deepwood Road, thanked the committee for hosting the Community Input Meeting on October 16th. He stated that the students gave great tours and that the building speaks for itself. He stated that this event was a success because getting people into the building is the most impactful way to make individuals aware of the issues facing the facility, and how these issues affect students and faculty. He emphasized that the special needs sections of the facility are small and hopes it is a criterion the committee is looking at.

Richard Selinga, 2 Crab Apple Lane, has experienced a school renovation as a former teacher. He stated that a minor renovation just puts a band-aid on the problems. He stated that Farmington has a great educational system, and that we cannot put a band-aid on a facility that needs a full overhaul.

F. To review and approve the draft evaluation criteria.

The committee broke into three working groups and reviewed a draft of the evaluation criteria. The draft evaluation criteria document is recorded with these minutes as Attachment C. After reconvening, the groups presented their recommended changes. Here are their suggestions:

- Cost/Value:
 - o Add "Total Project Cost," instead of Construction Cost
 - The addition of a "Life-Cycle Cost" was discussed, where the costs of each option are compared over the long term.
 - Emphasize that "maximize reimbursement" includes reimbursement beyond the State level, including utility incentives.

- Clarify how feedback from the State will factor into our process.
- Consolidation of Space:
 - o More clarity is required for "Board of Education Office."
- Site Improvement:
 - Add "Overall Impact on Neighbors," those abutting the school.
- Benefits to the Community:
 - Clarify how the facility will act as an "Emergency Shelter."
- Fit and Feel for Farmington:
 - Add more information in the description. This will help the design and professional teams.

G. To begin the discussion of sequencing/weighing the evaluation criteria.

The committee discussed pros and cons to weighing evaluation criteria. No final decision was made regarding whether to weight the evaluation criteria or not. The committee will continue this discussion at the next FHS Building Committee meeting.

The committee then began discussing the scoring process of conceptual designs. It was determined that each committee member would score options individually, then, an average of all committee member's scores for each option will be calculated.

I have been a Farmington resident for 5 years. We relocated to Connecticut from Florida, and chose Farmington because of the schools. Our entire location search was based on research we did to find the best schools/community near my husband's job.

I initially supported a new or renovated high school effort after learning about the broken elevator, and after attending a high school play and sitting in a folding chair. But most importantly, I supported it because of the security issues that the school presents if there were ever an active shooter in the building. Yes, this IS the world we live in today, and it is my understanding that the sprawling building could present an issue if this was ever the case.

After attending the high school walk through, all my initial concerns were confirmed, but so much more is needed to make the school a safe and allow for a thriving learning environment.

- Water Damage: Students should not have to come to school and be worried about their personal belongings getting wet because their locker got flooded -- this happened to one of the girls giving us a tour. Everything was ruined -- her books, her coat and her other personal belongings.
- Sprawling Building: Students should not have to brave the rain or elements of the New England winter because going outside through the quad and re-entering the building on the other side is the only way to make class on time. We were told during the tour, if students attempt to get to class by walking through the building they are about 2 minutes late -- every time.
- Safety: Student safety should not be compromised because every classroom does not provide the same amenities, like a TV for emergency announcements. During the tour, we visited a classroom that did not have a TV -- one of our tour guides was in this room when there was a medical emergency. While the rest of the school was told to stay in their current location until further notice, this classroom never received the notice. The emergency was a medical emergency where a student needed medical assistance, but again, if this event was putting the entire student body at risk, the students and teachers in this room would not have gotten the same emergency instructions.

I could continue to point out more deficiencies in the school and the reasons the upgrades are
