Update on Tennessee Gas Pipeline Project

In order to meet growing market demand for natural gas in northeastern United States, Kinder Morgan has proposed to install a natural gas pipeline to expand and upgrade its existing pipeline system in New York, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Connecticut.

The Tennessee Gas Pipeline Company, a subsidiary of Kinder Morgan, has held several community meetings, one at Farmington High School and one at the Farmington Marriott, to provide information on the gas pipeline project and its impact on the Town of Farmington. The Northeast Energy Direct (NED) project proposes to install 600-1,000 linear feet of new pipeline in the existing right-of-way adjacent to the existing Tennessee Gas Pipeline in Farmington, which is currently located near Old Mountain Road. This new gas line is being installed in a very small area of Town.

It is our understanding that Farmington residents will be direct beneficiaries of this project, as the goal of the NED project is to connect Connecticut and other Northeast states to a natural gas supply in order to reduce the overall cost of energy. The Tennessee Gas Pipeline Company has stated that pipelines are consistently proven to be the safest method of transporting energy, and assured us

that safety of our residents is not at risk. This project is monitored and regulated by the (Federal Energy Regulatory Commission).

The Farmington Department of Public Works is also closely monitoring all progress. I will continue to update the Town Council on the progress of this project. (Map attached)

Water Pollution Control Facility Upgrade

On October 8, 2015 bids were opened for the upgrade to the Farmington waste water treatment facility. The Town received four bids from contractors for the project. The low bid was submitted by C.H. Nickerson & Company, Inc. of Torrington CT at \$57,480,600. The bids have been reviewed by Town staff and staff of the project engineer, Wright Pierce, and they have found C.H. Nickerson's bid to be in order. They have also found Nickerson's references to be satisfactory. On Wednesday, November 4, 2015 the WPCA will review the bids and vote on a recommendation for award which they will forward to the Town Council. The WPCA will also vote on a funding plan to pay for the additional costs that will be incurred as the project moves forward. In addition, we are submitting the bid results to the State of Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) for their review and approval to award a contract to the low bidder. We anticipate that DEEP will approve the award by the end of November. Provided that we receive their approval by then, we will submit the full bid results to the Town Council for contract award at the December meeting.

Establish a subcommittee consisting of one Town Plan and Zoning member, one Economic Development Commission member, two Town Council members and appropriate staff members to define a Town Council goal on future public/private land development initiatives in the Town.

This committee has been very active since it was formed in late summer 2014. The committee met biweekly from September 2013 to June 2014. Starting in July 2015 the committee has met monthly.

After receiving the consultant's draft report in May 2015, the committee reviewed the report and made minor modifications. The committee requested that the consultants provide an executive summary in order to summarize their findings and make the report more available to the community. In June, the draft report, the executive summary, and a cover letter from the Committee's chairman was made available electronically on the Town's website as well as through an e-news blast that was sent to attendees from the March workshops. Hard copies were made available in the Town Hall lobby, the Farmington Main Library, and the Town Manager's office. The committee urged residents to review the report and offer comments.

On September 17th, the committee held a community wide meeting at the Community Center. The consultants presented their report and received comments from attendees. The committee created an addendum to include new ideas that were brought up at the community meeting. The consultants will include the addendum in the final report. The Committee is excited about this final report which summarizes the results of the three-day set of workshops concerning the future development of the Farmington Gateway Study Area.

It is anticipate that the final report will be presented to the Town Council for acceptance at its December 2015 meeting.

Manage actions taken to improve traffic problems including meeting with the State of Connecticut Department of Transportation on a quarterly basis. Report on the following projects to the Town Council on a quarterly basis.

State Project #51-258 Replacement of Bridge over Roaring Brook, at Sanford and Hawley: the bridge project is under construction. The Engineering Division has coordinated with the DOT and their contractor to complete the replacement of the sanitary sewer as required by the project. The project has moved into its final phase and should be completed at the end of this December. Minor work will continue into the 2016 construction season.

Project #51-260/270 Safety and Operational Improvements Route 4 / Backage Road: The sanitary sewer replacement project # 51-270 is 90% complete. The contractor will be doing the final paving of the roadway for the winter by early November. The sanitary sewer project is funded 100% by the State of Connecticut. Project # 51-260, the roadway reconstruction portion of the project, was advertised in September 2015 with the bid opening on November 4. This two-year construction project will commence in the spring of 2016 and is expected to be completed in 2018.

Project #51-268 Rails to Trails to Plainville CT: The Department of Public Works, Engineering Division, is continuing to design the trail from Red Oak Hill to Plainville. The design is now 90% complete. Meetings have taken place with property owners along the trail as well as the Town of Plainville. Required agreements and approvals have been reached with the Town of Plainville. It is anticipated that the project will be advertised for bid this winter and construction to start in the spring of 2016. This project is funded through 80% Federal and 20% State grants.

Project #51-269 Intersection Improvements Route 177 at New Britain Avenue and Mill Street: The Department of Public Works, Engineering Division has selected a consultant and is near contract signing with the approval of the CT DOT. The Town of Farmington Engineering Division will manage the consultant design process as well as the construction of this project. The DOT will manage the Right of Way process. The design is expected to be complete by the summer of 2016, with the Right of Way phase taking up to a year, depending on the State's negotiation process.

Construction funding is currently being reviewed to determine what year it will be available.

Route 4 CRCOG Corridor Study: The Town of Farmington, in conjunction with CRCOG, selected a consultant and are working through the approval/scoping process. CRCOG is managing the project in conjunction with the Engineering Division Staff. The study will take up to 18 months to complete.

<u>South Road Reconstruction</u>: The Department of Public Works, Engineering Division, has completed 90% of the design and the plans have been reviewed by CRCOG and their consultant. The design is proceeding and should be completed this fall. We are working with CRCOG and the DOT for the final construction schedule most likely the spring/summer of 2016.

<u>Garden Street Sewer Replacement</u>: The replacement of the existing sanitary sewer project from Maple Street to Garden Street has been completed.

As you can see from this report there is a tremendous amount of work in progress. It has been the top priority of the Engineer Division to keep all of the above projects moving forward. This will continue into the spring and summer of 2016 with the many construction projects beginning and/or continuing.

In addition to work conducted by the Committee, both the Committee and Town Staff have actively supported the efforts of "Bicycle Friendly Farmington", a community group that shares the Committee's goals of promoting bicycling and bicycle safety in Farmington.

Since receiving the League of American Bicyclists's Bronze level designation in May 2014, the Bicycle Committee has been actively working to promote bicycling and bicycle safety within the Town. Recent achievements include an approval from the Town's Traffic Review Board to install sharrows on Coppermine Road as well as researching and finding locations to place the signage highlighting Farmington's achievement in becoming a Bicycle Friendly Community. In addition, based on the Bicycle Committee's recommendation, the Town Plan and Zoning Commission approved new regulations which include bike racks on site development projects.

As you are aware, the Town applied for and was awarded a Main Street Grant from the State of Connecticut to replace the sidewalks along Plainville Avenue, specifically due to the large wheel chair population that utilizes the sidewalk as their means to travel to and from downtown Unionville. These mobility issues are taken very seriously and were the motivating force behind applying for the Main Street Grant. From the onset of the design development process for this project, the town Engineering Staff has been coordinating with the Human Relations Commission to discuss concerns of access around the construction area and provide the most beneficial project feasible, while limiting disruption to the users of the sidewalk system. On July 8, 2015 the Town presented the project to the Human Relations Commission, who were pleased with the project. Through the coordination efforts with the Human Relations Commission, the option for New Horizons to utilize their existing van service to transport their residents while construction work is taking place was discussed. They will maintain their access into and out of downtown Unionville by way of their van service. As standard practice when working on the sidewalk system in Unionville, the Town will have extensive coordination with the Human Relations Commission, affected residents and businesses to discuss progress, sidewalk impacts, and available travel options.

We have a scheduled a meeting with New Horizons to coincide with the Human Relations meeting held at New Horizons on November 9th. The sidewalk component of this meeting is being advertised amongst the residents of New Horizons. In addition, there was a community meeting with abutters on November 4, 2015.

We expect to advertise in December 2015 for a spring 2016 construction start. The project is expected to be completed in August, 2016.

To complete the final design for a comprehensive upgrade of the Water Pollution Control Plant. Receive all appropriate Federal/State and Local approvals. Advertise and award bid for a fall 2015 construction start. Provide quarterly reports to the Town Council.

On October 8, 2015 bids were opened for the upgrade to the Farmington waste water treatment facility. The Town received four bids from contractors for the project. The low bid was submitted by C.H. Nickerson & Company.

In early November, the WPCA will review the bids and vote on a recommendation for award, which they will forward to the Town Council. The WPCA will also vote on a funding plan to pay for the additional costs that will be incurred as the project moves forward. In addition, we are submitting the bid results to the State of Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) for their review and approval to award a contract to the low bidder. We anticipate that DEEP will approve the award by the end of November. Provided that we receive their approval in time, we will submit the full bid results to the Town Council for contract award at the December meeting.

Construction is anticipated to take 3 years to complete.

To work with the Farmington Cemetery to identify Town land that would be suitable for the expansion of the Riverside Cemetery.

The Town has continued to work with the Riverside Cemetery Association toward the location of suitable land for its future needs. The primary research has most recently concentrated on 124 Scott Swamp Road. This 8.5 acre property, located on the south side of Route 6 and to the east of New Britain Avenue, is owned by the State DEEP. Although past efforts to have the property conveyed to the Town through the State Legislature for cemetery use have failed, the Town has continued to work with State Legislators and DEEP representatives to determine if there is any chance of a conveyance in the future. While DEEP has submitted documents that confirm that the property was acquired as part of the much larger Shade Swamp Sanctuary to the north, and as such have held firm that they would not support the conveyance of this property to the Town, they have indicated that it might be possible to separate the property from the Sanctuary via a conversion plan. The conversion plan would be an agreement between the Town, the White Memorial Foundation (that funded the original acquisition), and DEEP. We are awaiting response from DEEP as to what the conversion plan will entail and will be meeting again with our State Legislatures to see if this property can be conveyed to the Town of Farmington.

BL Companies was selected by the Farmington-Hartford Staff to conduct environmental studies on the property. The results were presented to the staff committee in August and a community meeting will be scheduled in November to present the consultant's findings.

- A meeting was held on July 21; Kimberly Lesay from BL Companies outlined the work that would be completed and the timelines for completion of each task.
- On August 28, the staff met with representatives from BL Companies

Once the PSAs have been reassigned, prepare and issue an RFP and evaluate the responses to make a determination about whether the community is better served by staying with the current Basic Ambulance and Paramedic Services, or selecting different providers. Update the Town Council on progress and recommendations on a quarterly basis.

There has been significant progress on this goal. The Director of Fire and Rescue services has drafted an Alternative Local EMS Plan for the Town of Farmington as allowed by the new CGS 19a-181f which allows a municipality to petition for an Alternative Provider. This Alternative Plan was reviewed and supported by the Fire Chiefs, TFFD EMS Officers and the Farmington Police Chief.

This plan was then presented to the UCONN Health Center and American Medical Response Ambulance. As part of the Alternative Provision Process, the State requires that this plan be discussed with the Town's current providers.

Following the presentation of the Alternative Local EMS Plan to our current providers, the Finance Department issued a Request for Proposals for Emergency Medical Services for the Town of Farmington. The Town received 6 proposals in response to this request. The 6 proposals are presently being vetted by the Fire and Police Departments with a goal of recommending a provider for my consideration by the end of the year.

Our preliminary research shows that a pilot program is possible but it may be cost prohibitive for many reasons.

Research is almost complete and a full report outlining which section of trail could be utilized, budgetary implications, and recommendations will be presented to the Town Council in early 2016.

To extend the Farmington Canal Heritage Greenway Trail to the Plainville town line. Complete the design and bid specifications. Provide quarterly reports to the Town Council.

The Town of Farmington is working with the Connecticut Department of Transportation to extend the Farmington Canal Heritage Greenway Trail from its existing terminus at Red Oak Hill Road to the Town of Plainville. This project is part of a larger effort to complete the Farmington Canal Heritage Trail as an off-road bike trail from New Haven to the Massachusetts border and beyond. Red Oak Hill Road to the Town of Southington has been identified as the largest gap in this state-wide system, and it is the objective of this project to close this gap within the Town of Farmington.

The project will involve converting the rail bed formerly utilized by the New Haven and Northampton railroad company to a multi-use trail. This trail will generally follow the former railroad south from Red Oak Hill Road in the vicinity of New Britain Avenue to Route 6. A pedestrian bridge is proposed in the general location of the former Route 6 railroad bridge and the trail will continue south generally following New Britain Avenue, Hyde Road, and Johnson Avenue.

It is anticipated that the project will be bid this winter for summer 2016 construction.


We would like to ask the town to support the event by contributing the following:

To authorize the acquisition of property owned by Joanne Perloff and the Estate of Casmir Bycoski located at Lot 10A Slater Road (adjacent to Deadwood Swamp), (approximately 2.60 acres) for No Consideration in exchange for taxes due (estimated to be \$17,520.68 as of December 2015) subject to due diligence, including but not limited to a Title Search.

NOTE:

The property was originally part of a larger parcel that was divided by the construction of I-84. It is uncertain why this small portion was not also taken by the State at the time of the Interstate's construction. The property has no access and is likely mostly, if not all, wetlands as it is surrounded by the Deadwood Swamp (see attached map). The property is currently assessed at 100% excess land with no building potential.


Currently, one of the owners is deceased and the other is financially destitute and in poor health. The option for the Town to acquire the property in exchange for taxes due will enable the Bycoski Estate to be closed, and will remove this ongoing delinquency from the tax rolls.



To authorize the Town Manager to execute a "Memorandum of Understanding" between the Town of Farmington and the Town of Plainville for construction and maintenance of a portion of the Farmington Canal Heritage Greenway multi-use trail being built within Plainville's municipal boundary.

NOTE:

The Town of Farmington is working with the Connecticut Department of Transportation to complete the Farmington Canal Heritage Greenway multi-use trail. Design plans are currently being developed to connect the existing multi-use trail at Red Oak Hill Road with the Town of Plainville, approximately 2.4 miles to the south. The majority of this new trail system will be constructed along the existing railroad right of way in this area, and both the design and construction of this new trail system is being funded by the State of Connecticut.

As part of this project, the Connecticut Department of Transportation requested that our project be extended approximately 350 feet beyond the southern limit of the Town of Farmington, to Northwest Drive in Plainville. This request was made as the extension of the trail into Plainville allows for the connection to Plainville's existing bike network and provides a site for a parking area with trail kiosk, and other amenities. The Memorandum of Understanding is required by the Connecticut Department of Transportation and highlights that the Town of Farmington will construct site improvements within the Plainville municipal boundary, and that Plainville will own and maintain these improvements upon completion.

Funding for the design and construction of this project is being provided by the Connecticut Department of Transportation, with no municipal participation.

The Town attorney has reviewed this Memorandum of Understanding, and Town staff will be available at the Town Council meeting to answer any questions.

To authorize the Town Manager to sign the Agreement for Consulting Engineering Services for the development of contract plans, specifications, and estimates for State Project #51-269 Intersection Improvements along South Main Street from New Britain Avenue to Farmington Avenue.

NOTE:

Milone & MacBroom, Inc. was selected to conduct this work through a Qualifications Based Selection process in accordance with, and overseen by, the State of Connecticut Department of Transportation (CTDOT). The negotiated fee for this design work is \$282,596.00. The project is funded 80 percent federal, 10 percent state, and 10 percent by the Town of Farmington. The Town of Farmington's portion of the design fee was budgeted in the capital budget previously.

This project includes analysis and design for intersection improvements and new traffic control signals for the intersections of South Main Street at New Britain Avenue/Railroad Avenue, South Main Street at Mill Street, and South Main Street at Farmington Avenue.

This agreement for the Consulting Engineering Services is the standard agreement by CT DOT, which has been reviewed and approved by the Town Attorney.

Staff will be at the meeting should the Town Council have any questions.
