WHEREAS, Joseph J. Scarrozzo was born on December 10, 1916, and was raised in New Britain, CT, and was chosen to study art under Sanford Low at the New Britain Art League, and;

WHEREAS, Joseph J. Scarrozzo won a national art competition in 1932 and received a four-year scholarship to the Vesper George School of Art in Boston, and;

WHEREAS, Joseph J. Scarrozzo returned to New Britain in 1933 to provide for his four sisters and widowed mother during the Great Depression, and;

WHEREAS, Joseph J. Scarrozzo worked as a muralist from 1936 to 1939 with Sanford Low and Walter Korder, and for the Workers Progress Administration under President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, and;

WHEREAS, Joseph J. Scarrozzo spent several years working as a laborer at Stanley Works in New Britain and was later employed at Pratt & Whitney Aircraft for many years, and;

WHEREAS, Joseph J. Scarrozzo married Angelina Maria Latina in 1944, moving to Farmington and into the home he built in 1955 where together they raised six children: John, Robert, Anthony, Thomas, Jean, and Joan, and;

WHEREAS, Joseph J. Scarrozzo was a loyal member and past president of the New Britain Art League, and lifetime member of the Connecticut Water Color Society as well as the New Haven Paint and Clay Club, and;

WHEREAS, Joseph J. Scarrozzo has several works residing in the permanent collections of the Wadsworth Atheneum Museum of Art and New Britain Museum of American Art.

NOW THEREFORE, the Town of Farmington Town Council hereby wishes Joseph J. Scarrozzo a very happy 100th birthday and officially declares December 13th as "Joseph Scarrozzo Day" in Farmington.



LIGHT - open spaces, visibility, connection to the outdoors, and natural light;


FLEXIBILITY - furniture and spaces that are multi-purpose, adaptable, moveable;

INDEPENDENCE - space that fosters persistence, self-direction, choice and curiosity;



RELATIONSHIP DIAGRAM










OPTION A - MAIN LEVEL







OPTION A - THIRD LEVEL









EXISTING BUILDING




OPTION B-THIRD LEVEL





Farmington High School Building Committee Summary of Existing Conditions

www.fhsbuildingproject.org

<u>Infrastructure deficiencies at Farmington High School are significant, including, but not limited to:</u>

STATE AND FEDERAL REQUIREMENTS:

 The building and athletic fields do not meet numerous state and federal codes including the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA Accessibility)

SECURITY:

 Security issues include more than 23 points of entry into the school and no easily identifiable main entry

FACILTY INFRASTRUCTURE:

- Non-efficient and aging HVAC, mechanical, electrical and plumbing systems which are at the end of their useful life
- Building envelope and insulation are insufficient causing indoor temperatures to fluctuate with a lack of reliable heat as well as excessively warm learning spaces throughout the school year
- Inefficient building layout and old systems creating high annual energy costs
- Recurring maintenance issues requiring frequent planned as well as unanticipated major repairs
- Deteriorating masonry in the 1928 building

The existing Farmington High School (FHS) facility does not fully support a collaborative, rigorous, innovative education for which the Farmington Public Schools (FPS) are known. Issues include:

ACCREDITATION:

- The New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC) placed FHS on <u>warning</u> for one of the accreditation standards, Community Resources for <u>Learning</u>.
- According to NEASC, facility and space issues are constraining the implementation of curriculum and instruction and there is a lack of full compliance with state and federal laws related to the facility at FHS

INADEQUATE FACILITY LAYOUT AND SPACE IMPACTING TEACHING, LEARNING AND PROGRAMMING:

- Undersized spaces including the auditorium, cafeteria, media center, and some science classrooms
- High daily classroom usage strains the facility and limits current and future programs
- Lack of collaborative work spaces to support curriculum, instruction and programming
- One story layout creates inefficient student traffic flow during the school day
- Sprawling facility due to multiple additions since 1928 does not align to or fully support existing and future curriculum, instruction and programming


